### **Objectives:**

- 1. To understand the legal and institutional issues relevant to the international restitution of cultural property.
- 2. To locate the legal and institutional issues relevant to the international restitution of cultural property within the political economy of the post-colonial global order.
- 3. To draft an international code on the restitution of cultural property.

#### **Assessment:**

The clinic will be assessed on a pass/fail basis. In order to pass the course students must attend classes and participate in the drafting of an international code on the restitution of cultural property.
